"And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth." -John 1:14

Welcome to winter, everyone. There is much that could be pulled from the changing of the seasons theologically. One could talk about the sense of death that winter brings, the strength of those who endure such winters, or that it is just a period of time in which to get through. But I don't want to talk about any of that. Instead, let's talk about Gnosticism; pronounced naa-sti-si-zm. What is this weird word you might ask? Well it is a very old heresy in the Christian church, dated back to the 2nd century. The main tenets of Gnosticism are, that we were created by a lesser God, the God of the old testament, and that our souls are actually trapped in these bodies that the lesser God created, trying to escape to the one true God seen through Jesus Christ. They also believe that this world is evil and unredeemable, and the only way to salvation is through enlightenment and the escape from this flawed world through special knowledge, that, will guide us after we die to the one true supreme being. Jesus did not come to redeem this world, but rather to save us from it, by leaving us with special knowledge to follow.

## Pastor's Letter Continued...

Most of Gnosticism has been removed from the majority of Christian thought, but there is still one major tenet that still prevails and has saturated Christian theology today. That is the idea that we must obtain special knowledge here on earth so that when we die, we can escape this evil world for a better world in heaven. My sense is that many of you reading this will feel comfortable with this theological point. I mean we hear it all the time: if you just accept Jesus Christ as your lord and savior (right knowledge) then you will be saved (can escape this evil world). There is an escapism theology that permeates Christian thought today, and to me it is harmful. If Jesus truly did not come to redeem the world, but rather only offered a way out, then it opens up all types of careless and harmful theologies. It opens up the ability to excuse the destruction of the earth. There is no need to preserve or take care of the earth because it is all evil anyway, and this is not our home. There is an idea that evil is just a reality of life and there isn't much that we have to do to stop it, because we are trying to escape an evil world, not fix it. Lastly, it emphasizes a dualism, or a separation of our bodies and our souls, as if they don't interact or affect one another. Essentially, modern Gnosticism allows us to excuse abuse to anything material because the true treasure is trapped inside these fleshy bodies. But the problem with this way of thinking is that God isn't a lesser God, and that God created us and called us good. God loves creation, God wants creation to thrive and grow and be healthy. If Jesus just came to help us escape this world, then why would he have been so radical when it came to loving the poor, the outcast, and the lesser? If Jesus just came to help us escape, why did he spend so much time healing, feeding and enhancing the lives of those around him? Jesus, God, cares about the material world and the spiritual world. It is not an either-or, nor is it that one is better than the other. Both have their place in this thing that we call existence, and both are important, valued and cherished by our God. If we want to live our best spiritual life, we cannot remove the material world. Our souls and our bodies work together, and we are called to see the goodness in this world, as well as the world to come. This is not to say that this material world is perfect, far from it. Sin penetrates every aspect of life, not just for us humans but for all of creation. But that doesn't make this world inherently evil, it just means there is evil in a world designed for good. Even heaven wasn't immune to evil, Lucifer is a fallen angel after all. My point in saying all of this, is that when times get tough, or when life throws you just one too many curve balls, try not to fall into the trap of escapism. Trying to escape this world will not save us from the struggles we have every day. But rather, figuring out how to walk through them, and see God alongside us as we do so, will build a strength within us that we never thought possible. God calls us into the fullness of life, which includes struggle, and in our struggle, if we seek God and walk alongside, we will come out the other end, seeing our own existence and the whole of creation, closer to how God sees God's creation. I guess this turned into a winter message after all. If we can learn to appreciate the winter, learn to walk through the cold. When the warm air touches

our skin, we will understand the beauty that can be found, even in this material world. May God be your guide and your co-pilot, now and in the world to come, not your escape pod. Amen.

#### **Monday Night Meals**

This mission continues to be a blessing every Monday night to at least 40 families with an average of 110-130 meals served. It will be 3 years in January and we are so grateful for all the help we have been given. There are so many who help including the Highspire United Methodist church who comes every third Monday. Many thanks to all.

We are blessed to be able to offer non-food items and clothing. So many are appreciative of these offerings. We have many congregational members who continue to contribute to the many needed items. We have been given generous donations from the Fellowship Committee including \$500 from the Oktoberfest and also from many caring individuals. We continue to receive our food from Midwest Food Bank 4 times per month. They also support our own food bank.

We have gained another cook, John Rohrbach, and are extremely grateful for his time and expertise. He contributes many delicious meals. We could always use more cooks and helpers. Please call Sally Schonewolf at 717-265-3342 if interested in learning more. Everyone we help is so grateful.

**Thursday Night Takeout Meals** at Trinity continue to take place every Thursday from 5:30-6:30 pm. This outreach program began on May 20, 2021, and we thank the many people who have contributed to this mission by volunteering to serve, cooking, and contributing financially. Since this program was started, we have served 6,627 meals. The Midwest Food Bank continues to generously support this project. A few of our community members who come for meals have also graciously donated to the cause. Those who enter our doors are always appreciative of all that we have to offer. Our dedicated volunteers include: Judy Krovic, Matt Krovic, Jan Holwig, Ed Holwig, Zach Szekeres, Shelley Radic, Barb and Ron Kain, Nancy Paine, Patty Johnson, and Pastor Chad.

The number of meals served each Thursday has steadily increased, and we are now serving between 85 and 105 each week. Through the help of the **Fellowship Committee**, we have a rotation of cooks who are willing to prepare meals. If you enjoy cooking, join us! If you would be willing to bake casseroles or prepare a meal, or even a side dish, let us know. Our food bank source can often provide rice, beans, pastas, spaghetti sauce, vegetables, boxed potatoes, crushed tomatoes, potato chips/snacks, and various other ingredients to supplement the meals prepared. If anyone from either Trinity or St. Peters would be willing to help in serving or preparing food for these meals, please contact Jim or Sandy Canning at 717-652-3493 or sandycanning@verizon.net. You may volunteer when it fits your schedule. Many of the people who take out meals on Thursdays make use of the **Food Pantry** available to them in our social hall. Paper products (toilet paper, paper towels, and tissues) continue to be popular. 


# Happenings
